
The School Tour: "Do Your Homework in The New York Times"

Though some rolled their eyes, none of the responders pointed out that tours are for parents to size up the school, not the other way around.

Whether you are interested in seeing the school your child will attend $\hat{a} \in$ " if it is a zoned school, for instance, or your child has already been admitted; looking more broadly and want to weed out places for your child to apply to; or figuring out which school to make your first choice, taking a tour can be the most efficient way to find out whether a school is a good fit for your child and family.
